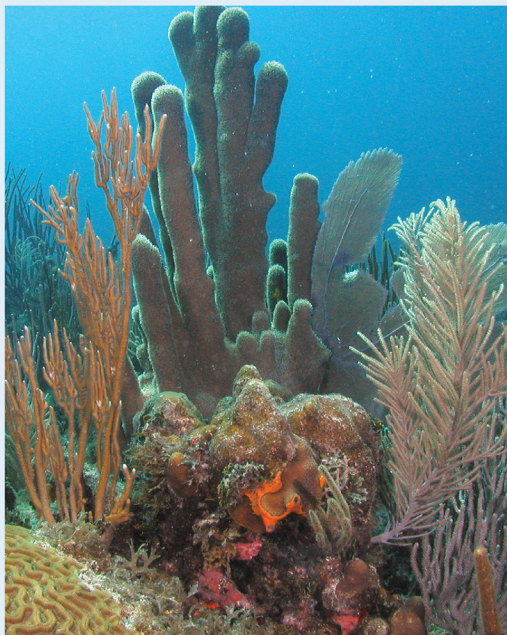

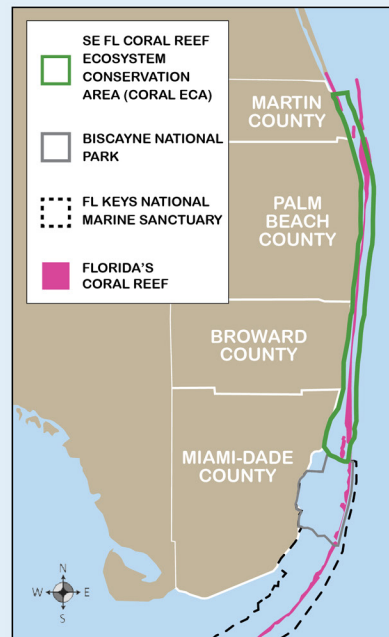

THREE WAYS You Can Help Protect FLORIDA'S CORAL REEF



1. REPORT MARINE INCIDENTS TO SEAFAN

You can report a marine incident online at www.SEAFAN.net or by calling the SEAFAN hotline at 866-770-SEFL (7335). No special training is required! Just report what, when and where the incident was observed and SEAFAN will coordinate a response.



2. PARTICIPATE IN REEF AND BEACH CLEANUPS

You can help keep Florida's Coral Reef clean by reporting any large debris items to SEAFAN and participating in local reef and beach cleanup events! For a list of cleanup events in your area, visit www.SEAFAN.net/MarineDebris.



3. JOIN THE BLEACHWATCH DIVE TEAM

If you are a snorkeler or diver, attend a free 2-hour training class to learn how to identify coral bleaching and disease and how to submit reports online.
